Franklin Center and Ripon Society Host Second Bipartisan Chiefs of Staff Luncheon of 2019

WASHINGTON, DC — Building off the inaugural luncheon held in January, the Franklin Center and Ripon Society hosted today its second monthly gathering of Republican and Democratic Chiefs of Staff.

In attendance were a mix of 10 Republican and 5 Democratic Chiefs, who were able to converse and get to know each other on a personal level -- something exceeedingly rare on Capitol Hill.

The featured speaker for this month's gathering was Commissioner Meredith Boadbent of the United States International Trade Commission.

As the current Administration works to shake up U.S. trade policy with countries ranging from China to Germany, Commissioner Broadbent's appearance

comes at a particularly relevant point in time for these leaders of Capitol Hill.

With the Commissioner leading the conversation, luncheon provided the opportunity for the an **Republican and Democratic** Chiefs to discuss current policies and trade the proposed U.S., Mexico, Canada Agreement and (USMCA), which will be

considered by Congress in the coming months.

Along with explaining the politics of past trade agreements, Commissioner Broadbent answered questions focusing on the present dynamics internationally and what can be expected in the coming months and years.

Franklin Center and Ripon Society President & CEO Jim Conzelman kicked off the event by talking about the time he himself spent as a Congressional Chief of Staff.

"When I was the Chief for former Financial Services Chairma Michael Oxley of Ohio, bipartisanship was not out of the ordinary. Today, at all levels of political relationships, from staffers to leadership, bipartisan relationships have become less common. This series of monthly lunches we are hosting aims to change narrative and make that bipartisanship more frequent

here in Washington, and something that will hopefully allow all of you all to find common ground."
